



# Executive Director's Message:



On behalf of the Lahore Biennale Foundation, I have the honour to present the annual report of the Foundation for the year 2019-2020. The year under report has been a Biennale year for the Foundation. Lahore Biennale Foundation (LBF) was proud to host the second edition of Lahore Biennale (LB02) under the curatorship of Sheikha Hoor al Qasimi. For nearly

six years the Lahore Biennale Foundation has operated within the arts and cultural sector of Pakistan. During this period it has provided free and accessible public programming; in addition to building a discourse on multi-disciplinary thinking and regional artistic dialogue through the fostering of institutional and cross-sector alliances. In the city's most recent foray into promoting contemporary art, the Foundation's efforts were monumental in creating multiple points of engagement with the city of Lahore. As Director of the Lahore Biennale I am deeply grateful and humbled by the assistance and support lent towards us by our partners, collaborators, well-wishers, friends and allies.

By bringing together the areas of art, education, economy and community development, the recent edition of Lahore Biennale

pathways for collaboration and infra-structural created improvements within our creative ecosystem. It also helped us identify more of the immediate impacts of hosting a recurrent, largescale contemporary arts exhibition. These include: promoting cultural economy, exchange between regions and artists of various regions, exposure to new thinkers and artists, contribution to art education, and learning opportunities created by the Foundation. At an economic and educational level, the month-long Biennale programming facilitated opportunities for mentorship, interaction between mid and early entry professionals as well as amongst those working across diverse disciplines. It added to our creative economy through the opening up of jobs for workers, especially freelancers in the gig economy who are practicing artists themselves and rely on part-time employment for a sustained revenue stream. Access to different locations in the city during both the research and exhibition period was graciously accorded to the Foundation, by different governmental bodies operating at the city and federal level.

We also got assistance when it came to the accommodation of the massive footfall we received during the research phase leading upto the Biennale, and of course the Biennale itself. To that end, the Foreign Office, Parks and Horticulture Authority, Evacuee Trust Property Board, Department of Information and Culture, and City District Government were immensely helpful. The Aga Khan Trust for Culture, Education Ministry, Lahore Development Authority, Federal Board of Revenue helped when it came to the facilitation of



incoming art works received on loan for the exhibition period. Similarly, the influx of travelers for the Biennale would not have been possible without the support of various law enforcement, environmental, cultural and tourism bodies: Punjab Revenue Authority, Puniab Police, Lahore Traffic Police, Protocol Department, Lahore Waste Management, Libraries Directorate, Secretary Housing, Punjab Information Technology Board and The Tourism Development Corporation of Pakistan. The list of institutions and individuals who aided the Foundation throughout its Biennale programming is by no means exhaustive and the Foundation alongside myself am indebted to the massive support extended to us by our long-term partners and collaborators: Our Founding Parton, Habib Bank Limited is a Pakistani multinational bank based in Karachi, Pakistan. True visionary and leaders in their field HBL has generously been the lead sponsor for both editions of the Biennale and LBF's many projects since the inception of the Foundation. With a shared commitment to promoting arts and artists, both institutes enjoy a shared synergy. Akzonoble and its subsidiary businesses have been involved in the craft of making paints and coatings, setting a worldwide standard in color and protection. The company has long maintained that art and architecture are imperative for thriving societies, and believed in supporting the arts when very few businesses in Pakistan were able to do so. They were one of the key supporters for both the first and second editions of Lahore Biennales. Barjeel Art Foundation, founded by Sultan Sooud Al Qassemi is a non-profit arts organisation based in the UAE. Barjeel has generously been one of the key sponsors of the Second Lahore Biennale. Sharjah Art Foundation,

founded by Hoor Al Qasimi in 2009 brings a broad range of contemporary art and cultural programmes to the communities of Sharjah, the UAE and the region, and has been an important partner of both the first and second Lahore Biennales. Goethe Institut Pakistan was one of the first cultural institutional partners of the Lahore Biennale Foundation. 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#### INTRODUCTION

The Lahore Biennale Foundation (LBF) is a non-profit organisation that seeks to provide critical sites for experimentation in the visual arts. LBF focuses not the many stages of production, display and reception of contemporary art in diverse forms. It understands inclusivity, collaboration, and public engagement as being central to its vision and is committed to developing the potential of art as an agent of social transformation. To this end, LBF endeavors to support art projects across Pakistan, especially those critical practices which are based on research and experimentation.

Other major initiatives of the Lahore Biennale Foundation include the Research Unit and Afforestation Lahore. An integral part of the Lahore Biennale Foundation (LBF), the Research Unit initiated in 2018, aims to foster archival, experimental, and theoretical investigations that offer new

insights into the art and visual culture of Pakistan. The Research Unit provides a platform for investigative learning, focusing on modern and contemporary art, visual culture and its social dimensions in Pakistan and its diasporas. It is committed to supporting creative art practices, promoting a diverse cultural ecology, and encouraging interdisciplinary approaches and outcomes.

Climate change presents a tangible threat and given its severity it is imperative to have all stakeholders united on one single platform. Afforestation Lahore encourages a collaborative and multidisciplinary approach amongst the fields of art and philanthropy in Pakistan. It focuses on supporting research and development – by building relationships with private, government, institutional and corporate partners, both at domestic and international levels.



LBF is supported by government bodies, and has developed enduring relations with international partners. These partnerships at home and aboard attempt to bridge institutional gaps between Lahore and the rest of the world.

Its flagship event, the Lahore Biennale, is held every two years. The inaugural Lahore Biennale was presented in 2018. The second Lahore Biennale in 2020 was curated by Hoor Al Qasimi, President and Director of Sharjah Art Foundation, who brought her experience in curating and promoting the contemporary art of this region, and her knowledge of the global contemporary art world and its institutions to Lahore.

#### What is Biennale

A Biennale (bi-annual) is the most prestigious art event a city can host. The biennale invites artists from all over the globe to use the city as its canvas and transform the city into a living art gallery. From the nooks and crannies of sub-urban living to the high rises of the business districts, the city is re-imagined to create a multifaceted academic and cultural exhibition. A Biennale brings art to the public spaces and engages the city's population in rich art-based programming ranging from display of spectacular pieces of art; lectures, workshops, panels and curated tours.

# The Inaugural Lahore Biennale

The Lahore Biennale Foundation hosted its inaugural edition of the Lahore Biennale (LB01) from 18th to 31st March, 2018. LB01 was a fourteen-day event that deployed Lahore as a platform for a dynamic exhibition and attracted an audience of over 1.5 million. The primary aim was to celebrate creativity, foreground diversity, foster coexistence and participation. LB01 tested parameters of "art" and "public," and contextualized their relation within the specificities of Lahore. Participants came from all across the world including: Austria, Bangladesh, India, Sri Lanka, Turkey, UK and USA.

The LB01 organizational team consisted of Executive Director Qudsia Rahim, who curated the public art projects; Academic Advisor IftikharDadi, who was the main advisor of the academic component; Exhibition Design Advisor Raza Ali Dada who developed the production and exhibition design; Publications

Advisor Ayesha Jatoi who worked on the accompanying LB01 publications.

The LB01 invited artists, groups, and institutions from across the world to work on various scales and at multilayered sites through the city of Lahore. Exhibitions and events for LB01 were held at seven major venues that engaged with the city's Mughal, Colonial and Modern layers. Venues included Alhamra Art Complex, Bagh-e-Jinnah, Lahore Fort, Canal, Shahi Hammam, Mubarak Haveli and Lahore Museum.

# LB01 Programming

LB01 programming included workshops for youth held at Bagh-e-Jinnah for the two-week period that catered to children ages eight to sixteen, a comprehensive program of Academic Forum talks, and artSPEAK talks which took place from March 19 – March 31. Three workshops were also part of the Academic Forum, on the topics of Curatorial Practice, Climate Change and Art Writing.

#### **Academic Forum**

The Academic Forum, curated and organized by IftikharDadi had an attendance of over 2500 people. It aimed to foster broad and imaginative discussions on art, culture, and society by bringing comparative and cross-disciplinary perspectives from other locations to Lahore. Forum themes included topics such as the transaction between studio practice and social engagement, the relation of art



practice to history, archive, memory, and place, and the role of institutions in engendering critical thinking and public debate.

#### artSPEAK

Curated by Aziz Sohail, the artSPEAK series included lectures and panels which highlighted elements of artistic practices, with the audience constituting an integral part of the dialogue. It allowed the audience of 2500 people to engage with the work on display, and for artists to re-examine their own practices.

#### Youth Forum

The Youth Forum's primary goal was to expose children and young adults between the ages of eight to sixteen to contemporary and public art. It included activities like creative workshops, community art outreach, craft competitions and activities for younger children and families. The event was sponsored by Lahore Grammar School, Beaconhouse School System, Global Shapers Community Lahore and The Little Art.

#### **Commissioned Curated Exhibition**

For this exhibition titled "Invitation to Action," curator Mariah Lookman took inspiration from a short sketch by Saadat Hassan Manto on the nature of mindless violence during and after the partition of India in 1947. List of participating artists included: Aisha Khalid, Alia Syed, Ayesha Jatoi, Ayesha Sultana, Asvajit Boyle, LalaRukh, Mahbub Shah, MinamApang, MuhannedCader, RaselChowdhury, T Shanaathanan and ZahoorulAkhlaq.

# **Performing Arts**

The opening and closing weekends comprised of performances by SalimaHashmi who revived the school teacher character from her highly satirical performances to address the divided present; Zambeel Dramatic Readings, a theater group that presented dramatized readings set against the backdrop of Pakistan railways; and Naiza Khan's performance that was a culmination of a multi-year engagement with the site of Manora in which she addressed weather patterns, boundaries and bodies.

Other acts included a collaborative music-performance with Pulitzer prize winning composer Du Yun, and Pakistani musician Ali Sethi, for the unveiling of ShahziaSikander's work, Disruption as Rapture. Also a part of the music component was "Visaal e Yaar" a concert/recital featuring Coke Studio vocalists Ali Sethi, Javed Bashir, ShaziaManzoor and Rachel Viccaji, and a tribute to the late artist LalaRukh.

# Digital Media

Two separate digital marketing platforms were utilized for the coverage of LB01, namely publications with a local and international outreach, and social media. In terms of local and international outreach, LB01 was mentioned in over 200 articles, with a bilingual focus, featuring writings in both English and Urdu. For social media, platform-specific content was generated for Facebook, Instagram, Twitter, and over the course of 14 days engaged about 632,000 unique accounts.





# LAHORE BIENNALE 02: between the sun and the moon

Curated by Hoor Al Qasimi, the second Lahore Biennale (LB02) titled 'between the sun and the moon' ran from January 26 until February 29, 2020. It brought together a plethora of artistic projects to cultural and heritage sites throughout the city of Lahore including more than 20 new commissions by artists from across the region and around the world. With a focus on the Global South, where ongoing social disaffection is being aggravated by climate change, LB02 responded to the cultural and ecological history of Lahore and aimed to awaken awareness of humanity's daunting contemporary predicament. Works presented in LB02 explored human entanglement with the environment while revisiting traditional understandings of the self and their cosmological underpinnings. Inspiration for this thematic focus was drawn from intellectual and cultural exchange between South and West Asia.

The second Lahore Biennale (LB02) built on the success of the inaugural Lahore Biennale of 2018 (LB01), fostering new linkages with the wider region. LB01 focused on the local, national and the South Asian context. LB02 consolidated these ties and foregrounded new relations with Central Asian, West Asian, and African contexts. It did so by bringing significant artistic forms and projects to Lahore, and commissioning new works by artists who have not previously engaged with the city.

How might we reflect on our place within the cosmos today, at this conjuncture of planetary climate crisis and polarities between societies? LB02 looked upwards with a view to forging new resonances, new imaginings of the future that encompass the full breadth of its material and virtual possibilities.



Hoor Al Qasimi, Curator for the second Lahore Biennale



Hoor Al Qasimi, President and Director of Sharjah Art Foundation, is a curator and practising artist who received her BFA from the Slade School of Fine Art, London (2002), a Diploma in Painting from the Royal Academy of Arts, London (2005) and an MA in Curating Contemporary Art from the Royal College of Art, London (2008). In 2002, she was appointed curator of Sharjah Biennial 6 and has since continued as the Biennial Director.

Qasimi is President of the International Biennial Association; Chair of the Advisory Board for the College of Art and Design, University of Sharjah and a member of the advisory boards for the Khoj International Artists' Association, New Delhi and Darat al Funun, Amman. She also serves on the boards of MoMA PS1, New York; Kunst-Werke, Berlin; Ashkal Alwan, Beirut and Sharjah Architecture Triennial, Sharjah. She is Visiting Lecturer at Slade School of Fine Art, London and Scholar-in-Residence at the Institute for Comparative Modernities, Cornell University, Ithaca, US. She has served on juries for the Prince Claus Award Committee (2016–present), Bonnefanten Award for Contemporary Art (2018), Maria Lassnig Prize (2017), Hepworth Wakefield Prize (2016), Benesse Prize (2013) and the Berlinale (2012). Recent curatorial projects include Hassan Sharif: I Am The Single Work Artist (2017–2018); Yayoi Kusama: Dot Obsessions (2016–2017); Robert Breer: Time Flies (2016–2017); Farideh Lashai (2016); and Simone Fattal (2016).



# Inaugural Weekend

second edition of the Lahore Biennale (LB02) on January 26. 2020. The inauguration ceremony took place amidst majestic surroundings in Hazuri Bagh, a garden in the city's historic fort. Newly commissioned projects were unveiled alongside important works of contemporary art: Diana Al Hadid's remarkable public sculpture in the gardens of Divan-e-Aam, inspired by the popular legend of Anarkali; installations by diaspora artists Hajra Waheed, Haroon Mirza and Khadim Ali and paintings by Ethiopian artists created in Lahore. In the Summer Palace, dozens of participating artists and curators visiting Pakistan for the first time mingled with the public as they viewed Wael Shawky's Cabaret Crusades, exhibited alongside sculptures by Dagestan's Taus Makhacheva.

Local and international artists and curators, public figures and Chief guest Dr. Arif Alvi, the President of Pakistan, thanked patrons gathered with art lovers over the weekend to open the second edition of the Lahore Biennale (LB02) on January 26. Foundation, for her efforts in curating the Biennale.

A centerpiece of the Biennale was an ambitious, immersive multimedia installation on Islamic cosmology at the PIA planetarium. Created by Berlin-based, Kazakhstan-born artist Almagul Menlibayeva, it is inspired by the astronomical discoveries made by Islamic astronomers in Samarkand. Site-specific performances by the Amsterdam-based sound artist German Popov and Russian artist Inna Artemova have added to its sublime effect, mesmerizing visitors on subsequent days with the help of classically trained local musicians. Other noteworthy performances included a stunning musical experiment by Haroon Mirza in Gaddafi Stadium's Alhamra Amphitheatre. Veteran artists Rasheed Araeen and Anwar Saeed were honored with special awards.

#### Academic Forum

The Academic Forum is an integral dimension of the Lahore Biennale. It aims to foster broad and imaginative discussions on art, culture, and society by bringing comparative and cross-disciplinary perspectives from other locations to Lahore. The Academic Forum brings over a dozen distinguished international curators, critics, and scholars to give public lectures, participate in panel discussions, conduct workshops, and do studio visits with local artists.

Topics selected have comparative relevance for the artistic, academic, and public context of Lahore. Highlighted in this edition's Academic Forum are a series of lectures and workshops spread over the course of the Biennale. These primarily outline contemporary discourse surrounding left-leaning politics, cinema in Pakistan, food culture, anti-colonial movements, feminist transnational networks, and problems inherent to the historiography of Indian art criticism amongst others.

The Academic Forum was organised by Iftikhar Dadi.

Iftikhar Dadi is an associate professor in Cornell's Department of History of Art. He is the author of Modernism and the Art of Muslim South Asia (2010) and the edited monograph Anwar Jalal Shemza (2015). He has co-edited Lines of Control: Partition as a Productive Space (2012); and Unpacking Europe: Towards a Critical Reading (2001). Dadi serves on the editorial advisory boards of the journals Archives of Asian Art; Bio-Scope: South Asian Screen Studies; and Art Journal (2007-2011). He is advisor to Asia Art Archive (Hong Kong), and co-director of The Institute for Comparative Modernities at Cornell University. Dadi received his Ph.D. from Cornell University.

#### Youth Forum

The Youth Forum is an initiative of the Lahore Biennale Foundation (LBF), where LBF, along with different institutional partners, actively engages with younger audiences that include in school and out of school children, through public and private sector schools from all across Lahore. These interactions created conversations through arts via community building programming that connect children nationally and globally, while fostering a greater interest in the arts.

The objectives of Youth Forum are to lend advance encouragement & capacity enhancement, encourage critical thinking skills as students get to experience art outside of their screens or text books, sark creativity & curiosity using tools like interaction with art spaces and programs e.g learn about maps, architecture and exhibition design etc, experiential & imaginative learning through inquisitive questioning, learn about history, art & education, free educational resource and community building and inclusion beyond socio-economic boundaries (of both public and private sector)

The Youth Forum catered more than 5000 students under the age of 16 over a duration of two weeks through curated tours, workshops and artist talks at 6 Biennale sites including PILAC, PIA Planetarium, Lahore Fort, Tollinton Market, Lahore Museum, Punjab University and Bradlaugh Hall. 90% of the participating students are currently attending public schools in Lahore where 97% were female students. Some of the sessions included a talk by Punjab Education Minister Murad Ras, Associate Professor in Cornell's Department of History of Art Iftikhar Dadi, Visual artists Imran Ahmad Khan and Ayesha Zulfiqar and Executive Director PILAC Saman Rai.

The Youth Forum is curated and organised by Aimon Fatima, an anthropologist and heritage manager who works actively with indigenous communities and young adults from less opportunistic background. Her particular focus is to design capacity enhancement programs by augmenting the concepts of diversity, peace and pluralism amongst the youth in Pakistan through encompassing cultural components.



# Music Program

The Music Programming of the second edition of the Lahore Biennale (LB02) was a new addition to the programming where audience experienced a musical journey starting from the Northern Mountains of Pameer (*Gilgit*) to the Southern coasts of Balouchistan (*Makran*) - a journey that resurfaces our ancient heritage while celebrating the mutual linkages of Arabia, Turan, Africa and the global South.

Over the course of time, the people of the global South have expressed themselves with musical notes that transcend beyond physical form and amalgamate communities from diverse backgrounds and dissimilar associations. This process of unification is strongly related to the fluid nature of water that flows beyond geographical boundaries and unites populations. While the Goddess Sindhu (River Indus) glided across sub-continent creating trade routes and nurturing civilizations, the collaboration of various trading nations gave birth to multi-layered musical expressions and instruments that were not only deeply rooted in regional tradition but also created space for global innovation.

The theme of LB02 Music Program was "Love, Longing and Pain – a musical journey across Pakistan". The music program was curated by Aimon Fatima, an anthropologist and media anchor with a keen interest in documentation, preservation and promotion of intangible cultural heritage of Pakistan.

It also helped us identify more of the immediate impacts of hosting a recurrent, large-scale contemporary arts exhibition. These include: promoting cultural economy, exchange between regions and artists of various regions, exposure to new thinkers and artists, contribution to art education, and learning opportunities created by the Foundation.

All of this was exhibited with the adage of a curatorial premise that underscored the interconnectivity of divergent species, communities, and ways of coexistence at a time of climate change and rapid urbanisation. Moreover, the Biennale sought to be interactive in a lot more ways than simply relying on the intuitive nature of our Biennale visitor and their interpretation of the art on display.

There were also innumerable networking and mentorship opportunities especially for students and early professionals which connected artists, creative practitioners, arts and cultural leaders, and scholars within the disciplines of art history, urban planning, and humanities.

At an economic and educational level, the month-long Biennale programming facilitated opportunities for mentorship, interaction between mid and early entry professionals as well as amongst those working across diverse disciplines. It added to our creative economy through the opening up of jobs for workers, especially freelancers in the gig economy who are practicing artists themselves and rely on part-time employment for a sustained revenue stream.


Our complete Biennale team encompassed a wide-range of roles and responsibilities including the less common ones: art and event documentation, graphic design, art education, artist assistant/liaison, city docents, site-management, and art handling and transport. In terms of the new and unfamiliar, we introduced avenues for further

training in arts management — that is currently a burgeoning field in Pakistan.

Access to different locations in the city during both the research and exhibition period was graciously accorded to the Foundation, by different governmental bodies operating at the city and federal level. Sites chosen for the Lahore Biennale can generally be perceived as belonging to more or less these three distinct periods in the history of the city's architecture: pre-colonial/mughal, modern and post-modern. We were able to not only successfully mount a 5-week long exhibition in an early nineteenth century hallmark of anti-colonial movement but also catalyse the ongoing efforts by grassroots and educational groups to restore the site and protect it from further depletion.

As a postscript to the success of the second Lahore Biennale, visited by over three million distinct visitors worldwide over a 5-week period.





User engagement within the last year sorted in descending order








#### Facebook statistics
